

## **Current Students and May 2019 BS Degree Recipients on Why They Chose to Attend UMD to Study Computer, Mathematical, and Natural Sciences**

**Aaron-Knoxville, MD:** I initially chose University of Maryland because it was a great in-state school for what I wanted to do (mathematics and computer science). After going here for four years, I can see that I made a great choice. In particular, the math department (my primary major) has wonderful and supportive faculty. The department has provided me with so many opportunities you can only get at schools that have a lot of research going on, while still giving me the chance to get to know some of my professors very well. I was a Strauss Undergraduate Teaching Assistant and recently my 3-person team placed 9<sup>th</sup> out of 568 teams in the William Lowell Putnam Mathematical Competition. And outside of academics, Maryland has just been a great place for me to be. The campus is still one of the most beautiful I've ever been on for a college, and most of the people I've met here just seem to really want to be here.

**Alina-Hanover, MD:** I was very impressed with the computer science program at UMD - I came in with barely any knowledge in the field, but over the years I have learned an incredible amount of information and pushed myself to complete projects I could not have imagined doing back in high school. Lastly, I have loved participating in fitness classes, especially dance fit and other dance master classes; I think being active in a way I truly enjoy has made me a happier person and a better student.

**Andre-Waldorf, MD:** I chose UMD for a lot of reasons. I knew I wanted to study CS and UMD is both local and a top 10 CS school. On top of that, the size of the campus was really exciting to me.
